"RECTITUDE IS PERPETUAL VICTORY"

"MILKY JITTERS"

For the woman living in the city tranquility of life is gone. The most simple details of existence are becoming more and more complicated every day. To retain some semblance of sanity, Mrs. Canada must combine the wisdom of Solomon with patience galore and courage a-plenty. Yet some people ask "where do the jitters come from?"

Take a simple task like ordering the morning milk. A quick carefree decision no longer suffices. Contentment, quiet pastures, electric milking machines, and music have done something to cows.

Back in the days when brides blushed becomingly and men shaved with straight-edge razors, it was simple milk and cream. Of course, there was skimmed milk at a dime a gallon, and also buttermilk. But for all practical purposes, it was milk through the week, and cream when company was expected.

Today, the morning milk order requires careful calculation. Mrs. Canada has to weigh the values of milk, extra rich milk, nursery milk, chocolate milk, and homogenous milk. Cream has split three ways, into cream-double cream, and whipping cream. Buttermilk has merely dignified itself by becoming creamed buttermilk, although acidophilus milk must be put in.

One curious lady asked a milkman what became of plain old-fashioned milk right from the cow. He was puzzled a minute, then replied, "if you mean ram milk, lady, that's expensive stuff".

Even canned milk has become evaporated, irradiated, and loaded with vitamins.

However to mollify any indignant dairymen who cares not to talk milk-jitters, we leave it up to the cows who in turn will only give us a mute 'moo' for an answer.

At least we are certain for one fact, namely milk is white, excepting chocolate, so no matter what, let's drink our milk and enjoy it!

HELPFUL, HEDDIE SAYS.....

The other day somebody asked me- "what's a Pressure Cooker?" There probably are more others who have no idea what a Pressure Cooker really is--so here I am to give you an explanation.....

Pressure Cooking produces the most delectable meals in very much reduced periods of time. Foods in a pressure saucepan are cooked by saturated steam. Very little water is needed since the cooking time is short and there is practically no evaporation. When the water boils and changes to steam the saucepan is made steam-tight by adjusting a simple mechanical device on the lid. This creates pressure and forces the boiling point or temperature of the water to rise. For instance, at 15 pounds per square-inch pressure the temperature will rise as high as 250 degrees F. This very high temperature naturally means that foods cooked in a pressure saucepan take very much less time.

This amazing economy of time is perhaps the most outstanding advantage of this cooker. For instance, such vegetables as fresh peas and asparagus, which ordinarily take about 15 minutes to cook, can be cooked in 1 to 1 1/2 minutes by steam pressure. A beef stew which takes well over an hour usually can be cooked to perfection in 20 minutes.

Such a saving of time naturally leads to tremendous savings on your fuel bill. And by the way, a pressure cooker can be used on any kind of stove--electric, coal, wood, or coal-oil. So it isn't long before your saucepan has paid for itself!

More important still, because foods only take a matter of minutes, rather than hours, and the small amount of water used means that maximum amount of invaluable vitamins and minerals is conserved. And the steam-tight cover seals in the natural flavour of the foods.

Delicious whole-dinners can be pressure-cooked with amazing speed, --so you see, one saves a great amount of time when cooking under pressure!

Now, do you know what a Pressure Cooker is??
