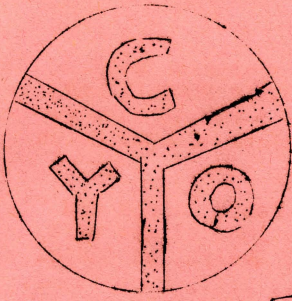

HEIFWU, HEDDIE SAYS.....

Do you know why POTATOES enjoy the immense popularity they unquestionably do? Could be because of their mild flavour, which makes them an ideal accompaniment for the highly flavoured meat course--as the conventional baked, boiled, or mashed potato. Or, it could be because of their wholesomeness nourishment and low cost.

There are innumerable ways of making the potato the basis for tasty dishes that are novel, economical and delicious. Give the family a treat some night by serving 'Stuffed Potatoes'.

Here's 'the how'--Cut baked potatoes in half, remove pulp, mash it, add milk, butter, salt and pepper until the consistency of mashed potatoes. Fill the cases with this mixture, dot with butter or brush with milk and bake about 8 minutes in a hot oven. For variety you might add the beaten egg white, grated cheese, chopped meat or parsley! Umm! A treat for a King!
