Palm Sunday maris the beginning of Holy Week: S d and terrible are the scenes pictured for us during Holy Week. Yot underneath all the suffering and woe, one great truth stands forth. Christ's crucifixion on Calvary is not the end. There will be the glorious sequel on Easter morn when we commemorate His glorious resurrection from the grave.
Holy Thursday--
only one Mass is offered in each church, and two hosts are consecrated; one for the sacrifice of the day, the other to be carried in the procession to the repository: where It is kept for the service on Good Friday. The Blessed Sacrament is removed from the main altar and the priest.strips the altars of their coverings. This represents the stripping of, the garnents from Our Lord. On Holy Thursday, Our Lord instituted the Holy Eucharist and for this reason also we visit the repository to offer thanks to Our Lord for His priceless gift.

## Good Friday--

The death of Our Lord fills our hearts--the Church puts on the black of mourning and recounts the story of the Crucifixion. The service consists of the lessons, the prayers, veneration of the Cross, and the Mass of the Presanctified.

Everyone should try to attend every service on Good Friday. We should always keep our minds and hearts on the price our Saviour paid for our salvation, and with gratitude in our hearts always thank Hin.

The-best possible way to show Him our gratitude is by receiving Him at Holy Communion at Tastertime. The spotiess symbol of Easter is the lily, whose appearance portrays the Immaculate Lamb, and we
